# Call to Duty: 2020 Sacramento Home Winemakers Executive Board Appointed Positions

At the November meeting, our new President will be elected. As President, one of their duties is to make appointments to the board to serve in dedicated positions for one year as voting members of the board, along side elected board members. If you are interested in putting your name in the hat to serve in any of the following appointed positions, please email or call Board of Directors member, Donna Bettencourt, at (916) 548-3199 or e-mail her at <a href="mailto:donnab1045@gmail.com">donnab1045@gmail.com</a>. Term is one year, beginning in January. It is expected that appointed board members would also attend at least 75% of called monthly Executive Board meetings, first Wednesday of most months.

<u>Cellarmaster:</u> The Cellarmaster makes sure that wines at the monthly meetings are organized and poured in a timely manner, working with the speaker/evaluator for the program. They also bring home dirty glasses each month and bring them to the next meeting.

<u>Newsletter Editor:</u> The Newsletter editor receives articles for the monthly newsletter, organizes and edits the content, and publishes them on our website, and blasts them out to members one week before the monthly meeting.

<u>Chief Judge</u>: The Chief Judge organizes the judging of the wines at the annual Jubilee Competition, soliciting judges and ensuring the integrity of the judging by presiding over the judges. The Chief Judge also receives and verifies the Winemaker of the Year entries and results in late November.

<u>Competition Coordinator</u>: This appointed position organizes all the components of the annual Jubilee Competition – judging, site, food, cellar, and clerk. They solicit member volunteers to head up each department and keeps them on track for the day of judging. After the competition, ribbons are ordered and labeled and distributed along with the judging sheets.

<u>Hospitality Coordinator</u>: This position arranges for the presence of bread and cheese at our monthly meetings, and for their set up. They may solicit members to bring the items by enlisting volunteers.

<u>Equipment Coordinator</u>: In this position, the appointed members arranges for the member keepers of the club equipment (crushers, presses, scale, filter) and coordinates the rental and rental payments for the equipment. They make sure the equipment is returned clean and in good shape, and on time. Members are required to have completed equipment training and to have signed an equipment waiver after training.

<u>Education Committee Chair</u>: This appointed position selects members to sit on their committee which, in coordination with the Vice President, plans for educational events for SHW members, including Winemaking 101, Home Winery Tours, and Winemaking 201. They solicit ideas from the membership for new educational workshops or tours. Meetings are held quarterly usually.
